



A fishing permit is required to take or attempt to take any fish, bullfrogs, snapping turtles, tiger salamanders, mussels or minnows by any method, except for the owner or the guest of the owner of any body of water which (1) is located entirely on private land, (2) is entirely privately stocked, (3) does not connect by inflow or outflow with any outside water and (4) is not operated on a commercial basis.

WHO IS REQUIRED TO HAVE A PERMIT?

A resident fishing permit is required for all Nebraskans 16 years of age and older. However, fee-exempt permits are available to veterans 65 years of age and older, and all residents 70 years of age and older. A "resident" is a person who has resided in Nebraska continuously for at least 90 days and who has a bona fide intention of becoming a legal resident of this state.

Others who may obtain a resident permit include: (1) servicemen officially stationed in Nebraska and on active duty here for at least 30 consecutive days; (2) nonresident students upon proof they have attended classes full time for at least 30 consecutive days at any Nebraska college, university, junior college, vocational school or any foreign exchange high school student; and (3) any person duly enrolled in and attending a civilian conservation center or similar government work or training facility for 30 consecutive days.

A nonresident fishing permit is required of all people who are not residents of Nebraska, except those listed and those under 16 years of age who are accompanied by someone possessing a valid permit.

Information and application forms for fee-exempt fishing permits are available only from the Game and Parks Commission office in Lincoln. See Boundary Waters section for permit requirements for people fishing the waters of the Missouri River.

LIFETIME PERMITS

Nebraska residents can now enjoy a lifetime of fishing or hunting on a single permit and support outdoor recreation at the same time. Fees are: Lifetime Fish, \$230; Lifetime Hunt, \$200; or Lifetime Fish and Hunt, \$400. Funds from these permits go into a special fund, with the interest each year going to help support fisheries and wildlife management in Nebraska. Trout Stamp

Everyone, 16 years of age or older, resident and nonresident alike, is required to have a \$5 Nebraska Trout Stamp, if they have trout taken in Nebraska in their possession. Holders of free permits are exempted, as are those who fish for trout in the put-and-take lake at Two Rivers State Recreation Area near Valley. Funds derived from the sale of this stamp are dedicated to the support of Nebraska's trout management programs. For more information, write to: Fisheries Division, Game and Parks Commission, P.O. Synopsis of Changes for 1995

SIZE LIMITS

The daily bag limit for striped bass, white bass and their hybrids has been changed to include only one fish over 18 inches. Calamus Reservoir has been added to the list of reservoirs that have a daily bag limit of 3 fish.

All waters west of U.S. Highway 183 will be regulated with a 15-inch minimum size limit for walleye, sauger and saugeye with the exception of those currently managed under an 18-inch protective length limit. The area cover by the 18-inch size limit on Harlan County Reservoir has been extended upstream on the Republican River to the Oxford highway bridge.

Branched Oak Reservoir will be regulated with a 36-inch minimum length limit for northern pike with a daily bag of 1.

BAG LIMITS

Black and white crappie, yellow perch, rock bass, bluegill and green, pumpkinseed, orangespotted and redear sunfish and their hybrids will have a daily bag limit of 30 either singly or in the aggregate.

CATCH AND RELEASE

Jenny Newman Lake at Platte River State Park will be open to fishing by children during set hours. Wildwood Lake and Jenny Newman Lake are the only total catch and release lakes in the state. New tackle restrictions exist on these lakes. All artificial lure hooks must be either barbless or have the barbs crimped.

NOTICE

This is a guide only. For sources, consult Nebraska statutes and official regulations.

It Is Unlawful...

- to borrow or use the permit of another or lend your permit to another.
- to leave fish or any part thereof on the banks of any stream, lake or other body of water.
- to fish on any private land without landowner permission.
- to use a crossbow or similar device, with the exception of handicapped person with a medical certificate on file.
- to seine game fish of any size.
- to leave minnows in a trap for more than 24 hours.
- to use drifting float lines, except on rivers, streams and Lewis and Clark Lake. They must be personally attended, and name and address must be attached.
- to use glass floats on float lines.
- to attach limb lines with nails, or more than 12 inches above the water to trees on any lake or reservoir.
- to possess live diploid grass carp (Ctenopharyngodon idella), also known as white amur. Anyone catching a grass carp must immediately kill or release it.
- to release in public waters of the state any fish that did not originate from that body of water.
- to attempt to snag fish, except in areas designated. See section on Snagging for details.

Seasons

HOOK-AND-LINE — Open year-round throughout the state, except as noted or as posted.

ARCHERY — Game fish may be taken from July 1 through Dec. 31 from sunrise to sunset. Nongame fish may be taken year-round from sunrise to sunset and 24 hours per day April 1 through Aug. 31 in inland waters. See section on Archery/Surface Spearing for exceptions. Hook and line limits apply.

SNAGGING — Missouri River only ... downstream from Gavins Point Dam stilling basin and powerhouse discharge canal markers to the mouth of the Big Sioux River (Mile Marker 734) beginning Oct. 14 and ending Nov. 12 or when an estimated 1,600 paddlefish have been harvested, whichever comes first. All other waters of the state are closed to snagging at all times. See section on Snagging for details.

SURFACE SPEARING — Only nongame fish may be taken from sunrise to sunset year-round and 24 hours a day

from April 1 through Aug. 31.

UNDERWATER SPEARING — Game fish may be taken from sunrise to sunset from July 1 through Dec. 31. Nongame fish may be taken year-round, sunrise to sunset. See Underwater Spearing section for open waters.

Bag and Possession Limits

Sport fishing is permitted year-round on all Nebraska waters, except for those areas closed by the Game and Parks Commission by posting or by Commission regulation, federal or state law or city ordinance.

Bag and possession limits may vary between "Inland Waters" and "Waters of the Missouri River." For this purpose only, "Inland Waters" include all waters of the state except the waters of the Missouri River and "Waters of the Missouri River" include all of the river within Nebraska and all reservoirs, oxbows, sloughs, chutes, backwaters and marshes that have annual surface water connection to the river and the first 300 yards upstream from the mouth of all tributary streams.


DAILY BAG — Fish taken from midnight to midnight. No person may possess more than one day's limit of fish while on the water or actively engaged in fishing. Fish subject to a bag and possession limit, but not a size limit, can be filleted prior to transport if the fillets are kept in one piece until cooked, so the bag and possession limits can be determined. Fish subject to a size limit can only be gilled and gutted.

Any fish caught that is not to be counted in the bag limit must be immediately released into the water with as little injury as possible. Any fish placed on a stringer, in a container or not returned immediately to the water must be counted in the bag.

POSSESSION LIMIT — Fish in a person's portable cooler, home freezer, registered in his name in a commercial cold storage locker or in any other way under his control. If given to another person, the fish must be tagged by the angler with the following information: the angler's signature; the angler's address; the total number of animals involved, by species; the date the fish or aquatic animals were taken; and the angler's permit number.

THREATENED AND ENDANGERED SPECIES — Lake Sturgeon and Pallid Sturgeon. Season closed. If caught, return to the water immediately. Anglers who catch either of these species are asked to notify the Game and Parks Commission's Fisheries Division so biologists can record where the species was caught.

SPECIAL LIMITS — In the following state-owned lakes, the daily bag and possession limit is 10 fish in combination. Two Rivers Carp Lake, Douglas County; Niobrara Park Lake, Knox County; West Lake No. 3, Louisville, Cass County; Fremont Lake No. 5 and Dead Timber Lake, Dodge County. Note: Many cities limit the take to less than 10. In Zorinsky Lake, there is a daily bag limit of 10 panfish (bluegill and crappie) in combination.



Hook and Line Limit

Anglers are limited to 2 lines with 2 hooks on each line in any pond, lake or reservoir, and for one-half mile in their inlets, outlets and canals.

In stream fishing, the limits are 5 hooks on a line or 15 hooks in the aggregate. Only 5 lines with 2 hooks on each line are permitted when ice fishing. Only 1 hook may be used when snagging.

One hook means a single, double or treble-pointed hook. All hooks attached to an artificial bait or lure are counted as one hook.

These limits apply to all fishing, including rod and reel, poles, float lines, bank lines, setlines and all other types. The name, address and fishing permit number of the angler shall be attached to floats of all float lines, and to all limb lines and set lines. Float lines may be used only on streams, rivers and Lewis and Clark Lake. They must be personally attended. The use of glass floats is unlawful. Bag and possession limits are the same as for hook and line.

Note limitations listed in Special Areas.

Size Limits

Fish may not be filleted until fishing is completed for the day where size and bag limits apply. Fish subject to a size limit cannot be possessed while on the water, while wading or while engaged in fishing with more than the gills, viscera and scales removed. Fillets must be kept in one piece until cooked, so bag and possession limits can be determined. Any fish in possession while actively fishing will be subject to size and bag limits that apply to the water being fished. Fish placed in public storage must be labeled with the owner's name, address, fishing license number, species and number of fish, and the date placed in storage.

BASS (LARGEMOUTH): 12-inch minimum: All private waters.

15-inch minimum: Statewide on all publicly owned, controlled or managed waters, except where other limits apply and parts of the Missouri River. There is a 12-inch minimum size limit on all black bass in the section of the Missouri River between Nebraska and Iowa and Nebraska and Missouri. There is a 15-inch minimum size limit on largemouth bass on the following Missouri River lakes and oxbows: DeSoto National Wildlife Refuge Lake, Washington County; Snyder Bend Lake, Dakota and Thurston counties; and Lake Yankton, Cedar County.

21-inch minimum: Buckskin Hills Lake, Dixon County; Zorinsky Lake, Douglas County; Skyview Lake, Madison County; Burchard Lake, Pawnee County; Wehrspann Lake, Sarpy County; and Willow Lake, Brown County.

BASS (SMALLMOUTH, SPOTTED): 12-inch minimum: Statewide on all publicly owned, controlled or managed waters, except where other limits apply and parts of the Missouri River. There is a 12-inch minimum size limit on all black bass in the section of the Missouri River between Nebraska and Iowa and Nebraska and Missouri.

BLUEGILL: 8-inch minimum: Stagecoach Reservoir, Lancaster County; Mormon Island Lakes No. 1, 2 and 3, Hall County; Wehrspann Lake, Sarpy County; and Zorinsky Lake, Douglas County.

CRAPPIE: 10-inch minimum: Branched Oak and Pawnee reservoirs, Lancaster County; Wehrspann Lake, Sarpy County; and Zorinsky Lake, Douglas County.

MUSKELLUNGE/TIGER MUSKIE: 30-inch minimum: Statewide.

NORTHERN PIKE: 24-inch minimum: All inland waters east of U.S. Highway 281.


36-inch minimum: Branched Oak Reservoir, Lancaster County (Daily bag limit of 1).

WALLEYE: 15-inch minimum: All waters west of U.S. Highway 183 from the Kansas-Nebraska border north to its junction with U.S. Highway 20 west and north on Highway 183 to the Nebraska-South Dakota border, expect for those regulated under the 18-inch size limit.

18-inch minimum: Merritt Reservoir, Cherry County; El-wood Reservoir, Dawson County; Harlan County Reservoir (including the Republican River upstream to the Oxford highway bridge), Harlan County; Branched Oak Reservoir, Lancaster County; Sherman and Calamus reservoirs, Loup County. Note: Only one fish longer than 25 inches allowed in bag at Merritt Reservoir, Cherry County; Sherman Reservoir, Sherman County; and Calamus Reservoir, Loup and Garfield counties.

BULLFROG: 4½ inches from snout to vent. ALL OTHER SPECIES: None.





How To Measure Length Of Fish

Lay the fish on a flat surface with the mouth closed and tail lobes pressed together. Measure the length from the tip of the snout to the end of the tail.

Archery/Surface Spearfishing

Game fish may be taken by bow and arrow from July 1 through Dec. 31 from sunrise to sunset, statewide. Game fish may not be taken with surface spears. Nongame fish may be taken by archery or surface spear year-round from inland waters, sunrise to sunset, and may be taken 24 hours a day from April 1 through Aug. 31.

With archery, only long bows (including compound bows), drawn by hand, are legal. A crossbow may be used by a handicapped person who has a medical certificate on file with the Game and Parks Commission's Fisheries Division. Arrows must be attached by a line to the bow and must have only one point, which must be barbed. Arrows with more than one point are prohibited.

The following areas are closed year-round — all put-and-take lakes stocked by the Game and Parks Commission; Two Rivers, Louisville, Fort Kearny, Fremont, Mormon Island and Windmill state recreation areas; Platte River State Park and Mahoney State Park; and trout streams (see Special Areas). For surface spearing, only hand spears are legal. Any spearing device must be barbed.

Underwater Spearfishing

Lawful spear guns include hand spears, rubberbandpowered spear guns and spring-loaded spear guns. All spears used on powered spear guns must be attached to a lanyard with a maximum length of 20 feet. Underwater spearfishing is not permitted within 100 yards of any designated swimming or water ski jump area, boat dock, boat ramp or spillway.

SEASONS

Game fish — July 1 through Dec. 31 in waters listed below. Bag and possession limits are the same as for hook and line, except that there is a daily bag of two walleye and a possession limit of four walleye in effect on all lakes listed below. Hours are sunrise to sunset.

Nongame fish — Open year-round in waters listed below. There are no size, bag or possession limits. Hours are sunrise to sunset.

DIVER'S FLAG

The diver's flag must be displayed on the water on a float or buoy when diving or underwater-powered spearfishing. A diver and underwater spearfisherman must remain within 150 feet of his flag. The flag must be at least 12 inches square, with a red background and white diagonal stripe that is one-fifth the width of the flag. The white stripe must run from the top of the hoist to the bottom of the flag. It is unlawful to display this flag when diving or spearfishing is not in progress.

Snagging

Snagging of paddlefish and nongame fish only is permitted in the Missouri River under season dates and limits specified in the Paddlefish and Snagging of Nongame Fish section of this guide, which follows. All other waters of the state are closed to snagging for all species at all times. Any game fish that are snagged accidentally or otherwise foul-hooked must be returned to the water immediately.



Paddlefish and Snagging of Nongame Fish

Missouri River

Snagging of paddlefish and nongame fish is permitted in the Missouri River from the Gavins Point Dam stilling basin and powerhouse canal markers downstream to the mouth of the Big Sioux River (Mile Marker 734) from sunrise to sunset beginning the second Saturday of October and ending 30 days later or when an estimated 1,600 paddlefish have been harvested, whichever comes first. The quota shall be determined by creel survey estimates, and the season shall be closed when the quota is reached. Signs will be posted, and media outlets will be contacted to notify anglers of the season closure. Only one hook may be used when snagging, and the gap between the point of the hook to the shank may not exceed ½-inch. The daily bag limit is one paddlefish. All paddlefish between 35 and 45 inches long (measured along the center line of the fish, laying flat, including the entire eye to the fork the tail), must be returned to the water immediately. The slot limit is aimed at protecting the majority of spawningsize fish. It is recommended that a gaff not be used to land paddlefish because it may damage its gills.

Paddlefish may be taken by bow and arrow in the Missouri River starting the second Saturday of July and ending the third

Sunday of July from the Gavins Point Dam stilling basin and powerhouse discharge canal markers downstream to the mouth of the Big Sioux River (Mile Marker 734).

Inland Waters

Paddlefish may be taken by hook-and-line methods other than snagging year-round in all inland waters. The bag limit is one paddlefish, and the possession limit is two paddlefish.

Paddlefish may be taken by archery in all inland waters per regulations governing archery and surface spearing.





Bullfrogs

Bullfrog season runs from August 15 through October 31. The bag limit is 8 bullfrogs per person. They may be taken only on a fishing permit by hand, hand net and hook-and-line. Artificial light may be used when taking bullfrogs. Bullfrogs must measure 4½ inches from snout to vent or be released. Only the entrails may be removed prior to transport.

Snapping Turtles

Snapping turtles may be taken year-round, and limits are 10 in the daily bag and 20 in possession. They may be taken only by hand, hand net, hook-and-line, bow and arrow or gaff hook.

Mussels (Clams)

Mussels may be taken year-round by hand, hand net or hook-and-line. The limit is 10 daily and 20 in possession.



Ice Fishing

When ice fishing, only 5 lines with no more than 2 hooks on each line are permitted. Each line or tip-up used while fishing public standing waters must be under the direct supervision and within the unaided observation of the angler. Holes made for ice fishing may not exceed 10 inches in diameter on any area controlled by the Game and Parks Commission.

A special \$5 permit is required to place a permanent ice shelter on all state recreation area and wildlife management area lakes. Application forms and shelter regulations are available from conservation officers, Commission offices or by mail from the Parks Division, Nebraska Game and Parks Commission, P.O. Box 30370, Lincoln, NE 68503-0370. This does not apply to temporary, portable shelters used and removed each day.

Bait and Minnows

Bait fish may not be sold except by permit. For commercial purposes (bait vendors, private fish culturists and nonresident fish dealers), please refer to the official regulations supplied with your permit. The following regulation guidelines apply only to bait obtained for personal use.

It is unlawful to take minnows from any lake, reservoir or bayou. Digging, seining and trapping for bait or any other purpose is prohibited on all state-owned or controlled areas. All game fish of whatever size taken while netting or seining for bait must immediately be returned to the waters from which taken. The bag limit of minnows for personal use is 100. Possession limit is 100.

GIZZARD SHAD — Shad may be taken for use as bait by legal minnow dip nets in any number from lakes, ponds, reservoirs, and below dams and other artificial obstructions for a distance of 200 yards below such obstructions. Live shad can only be used in the body of water in which they were captured. Shad may be taken by legal minnow seine, landing net or dip net in any number in streams except those streams closed to the taking of minnows or bait by such method. See Special Areas.

BELOW DAMS — The seining or capturing of minnows for commercial or private purposes for a distance of 200 yards below any dam, check, spillway or other artificial obstruction is unlawful. Individuals may take minnows for personal use as bait using a legal minnow dip net within a 200-yard distance below any dam; spillway or other artificial obstruction.

RESTRICTED SPECIES — It is unlawful to sell, transport or offer for sale as bait, any live carp, carpsucker, buffalo, gar, quillback or bowfin. Live fish of those species may be used for bait only in the same waters from which they are legally taken. Dead carp, carpsucker, buffalo, gar, quillback or bowfin may be transported for use as bait.

EXPORTING — No more than 100 legally captured minnows may be exported by a resident for his personal use in fishing outside the state. No other minnows taken from Nebraska waters may be transported out of the state in any manner, except minnows artificially propagated in man-made impoundments by licensed fish culturists.

IMPORTING — It is unlawful to import or transport carp, carpsucker, buffalo, quillback, gar or bowfin into the state for use as bait. Special permits are required for a person to import and sell bait or bait minnows.

SCENTS — Anise oil and other scents that do not stun, kill or harm fish are permitted.

FISH NETS AND TRAPS— The possession or use of any nets, traps, electrical gear capable of stunning fish or other devices except the following is unlawful:

- 1. Minnow seines of one-fourth inch non-metallic square mesh only and not over 20 feet long and 4 feet deep.
- 2. Minnow dip nets of one-fourth inch non-metallic square mesh. Neither length nor width may exceed 36 inches.
- 3. Minnow and bait traps of one-fourth inch square mesh material with a length of 24 inches or less, a diameter of 16 inches or less and a throat 1½ inches or less in diameter. All minnow traps shall be raised and the minnows removed at least every 24 hours.
- 4. Landing nets, made of non-metallic mesh, used only for landing fish caught on hook-and-line.

CLOSED WATERS — See Special Areas section.

Special Area Regulations

WILDWOOD LAKE — Possession of any fish species while fishing this lake is prohibited. Wildwood Lake is designated as a "No Kill Lake." All species of fish caught must immediately be returned to the lake unharmed. All hooks on artificial lures must either be barbless or have the barbs crimped.

SCHILLING WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT AREA (PLATTS-MOUTH) — This area is open to fishing from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m. daily from April 15 through Oct. 15 except when closed by the Commission by posting.

BURCHARD STATE LAKE — It is unlawful to fish in this Pawnee County lake during the waterfowl hunting season, beginning Oct. 15 until the close of dark goose season each year, except bank fishing from the face of the dam is permitted during this closed period as posted by signs on the area.

BUCKSKIN HILLS LAKE, SKYVIEW LAKE, ZORINSKY LAKE, BURCHARD LAKE, WEHRSPANN LAKE AND WILLOW LAKE — These lakes are designated as catch-and release lakes for largemouth bass. All bass caught must be immediately returned to the water, except that one fish that is 21 inches or longer may be kept in the daily bag.

TWIN LAKES (Seward County) — This wildlife management area is closed to all public use from Oct. 15 until the end of the dark goose season. East Twin Lake has a 15-inch minimum size limit on largemouth bass.

BUFFALO CREEK WMA (Scotts Bluff and Banner counties) — It is unlawful to use more than two lines with two hooks per line when fishing in Buffalo Creek Pond, including ice fishing.

FORT ROBINSON STATE PARK (Dawes County) — It is unlawful to use more than 2 lines with 2 hooks on each line when fishing in Cherry Creek, Icehouse and Grabel ponds. and Carter P. Johnson Lake. This includes ice fishing.

EUGENE T. MAHONEY STATE PARK, MARINA LAKE (Cass County) — Children under 16 years of age and handicapped adults are permitted to fish the entire lake, except the immediate marina area, from sunrise to 9 a.m. daily. Daily bag limit is two fish. There is an 18-inch size limit on largemouth bass.

EUGENE T. MAHONEY STATE PARK, US WEST LAKE (Cass County) — Fishing is permitted daily. Largemouth bass and bluegill fishing is limited to catch and release. The daily bag limit on all trout and channel catfish is three fish per angler.

PLATTE RIVER STATE PARK, JENNY NEWMAN LAKE (Cass County) — Children less than 16 years old are permitted to fish the entire lake, except the immediate marina area, from sunrise to 9 a.m. daily April 29 to Oct. 30. Possession of any fish species while fishing this lake is prohibited. Jenny Newman Lake is designated as a "No Kill Lake." All species of fish caught must immediately be returned to the lake unharmed. All hooks on artificial lures must either be barbless or have the barbs crimped.

CLEAR LAKE (Brown County) — It is unlawful to have in possession or use for bait any minnows, alive or dead while fishing this lake. Further, it is unlawful to have in possession any live fish other than those taken from this lake.

SHERMAN RESERVOIR (Sherman County) — Sherman Dam and the area paralleling the shoreline at the dam extending 150 feet lakeward shall be closed to fishing from sunset to sunrise April 1 through April 20.

NIOBRARA STATE PARK (Knox County) — Largemouth bass fishing is limited to catch and release on two park lakes; possession is prohibited.

TWO RIVERS STATE RECREATION AREA (Douglas

County) — Archery fishing, snagging, spearing, jigging, snaring and baiting are prohibited in all lakes. Lake No. 5 is designated as a put-and-take trout fishing lake and is subject to special regulations. A daily trout tag is required to attempt to take and to possess trout on the entire Two Rivers area. Check at area office.

CRESCENT LAKE NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGE -

Fishing is permitted during daylight hours in Island Lake year-round. Electric-type outboard motors only are permitted on lakes open to fishing. The use of internal combustion motors is prohibited. The possession or use of live or dead minnows and the possession of any fish not taken from refuge waters are unlawful. However, frozen or dead smelt may be used for bait. Overnight camping is not permitted.

VALENTINE NATIONAL REFUGE — Fishing is permitted year-round during daylight hours, unless otherwise posted. Electric-type outboard motors only are permitted on lakes open to fishing. The use of internal combustion motors is prohibited. Possession or use of live or dead minnows and possession of any fish not taken from refuge waters are unlawful. However, frozen or dead smelt may be used for bait. There is a 15-inch size minimum on black bass on all refuge lakes, except Watts Lakes, which is catch and release only for bass and muskellunge. All northern pike over 28 inches must be released. Special fishing regulations are in effect as posted. Please take note of the special regulations. Check at refuge headquarters for specific regulation information. Overnight camping is not permitted.

NORTH PLATTE NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGE — Lake Minatare and Lake Winters Creek are open to fishing from Jan. 15 through Sept. 30 or as posted. Waters within 150 feet of the dam at Lake Minatare are closed to fishing from sunset to sunrise from March 1 through April 30. There is a 15-inch minimum size limit on walleye in Lake Minatare and

Lake Winters Creek.

TROUT WATERS— It is unlawful to take or attempt to take game or nongame fish by bow and arrow or spearing and to take or attempt to take by seine or trap any bait or minnows in any of the following trout streams:

ANTELOPE COUNTY: Verdigre Creek and all tributaries. BROWN COUNTY: Bone Creek and all tributaries, Long Pine creek and all tributaries, Plum Creek and all tributaries and Fairfield Creek.

BOX BUTTE COUNTY: Niobrara River.

CHERRY COUNTY: Middle Loup River and all tributaries, North Loup River and all tributaries, Schlagel Creek, Fairfield Creek, Snake River and all tributaries, Plum Creek and all tributaries.

CHEYENNE COUNTY: Lodgepole Creek west of Brownson. DAWES COUNTY: Chadron Creek, Big Bordeaux Creek, Little Bordeaux Creek, White River above Crawford, Niobrara River from Box Butte Reservoir west to the Wyoming line and all tributaries, Dead Horse Creek, Squaw Creek and White Clay Creek.

GARDEN COUNTY: Blue Creek.

HOLT COUNTY: Steel Creek and North, Middle and South branches of Verdigre Creek.

HOOKER COUNTY: Dismal River and all tributaries.

KEITH COUNTY: Otter Creek, White Tail Creek and Lonergan Creek and all tributaries.

KIMBALL COUNTY: Lodgepole Creek and all tributaries. KNOX COUNTY: North, Middle and South Verdigre and all tributaries above the town of Verdigre and Steel Creek.

LOUP COUNTY: Gracie Creek.

MORRILL COUNTY: Red Willow Creek, Cedar Creek, Greenwood Creek, Wildhorse Creek, Lawrence Fork Creek, Silvernail Drain, Stuckenhole Creek and Pumpkin Creek below Highway 88.

ROCK COUNTY: Long Pine Creek.

SIOUX COUNTY: Sheep Creek Drain, Dry Sheep Creek Drain, Dry Spotted Tail Creek, Spotted Tail Creek, Niobrara River and all tributaries, White River, Soldier Creek and all tributaries, Monroe Creek, Sowbelly Creek and Hat Creek. SCOTTS BLUFF COUNTY: Nine Mile Creek, Winters Creek, Tub Springs, Wet Spotted Tail Creek, Dry Spotted Tail Creek, Sheep Creek, Dry Sheep Creek, Stuckenhole Creek, Akers Draw, Mitchell Drain, Moffett Drain, Alliance Drain and Bayard Drain.

SHERIDAN COUNTY: Snake River, Larrabee Creek, White Clay Creek, Pine Creek, Deer Creek and Little Bordeaux Creek.

WEBSTER COUNTY: Elm Creek.


It is unlawful to possess a net or seine of any type on trout spawning streams in Sioux, Scotts Bluff, Morrill, Garden and Keith counties that are tributary to the North Platte River and Lake McConaughy, including: Pumpkin, Red Willow, Wildhorse, Stuckenhole, Nine Mile, Tub Springs, Winter, Sheep, Dry Sheep, Spotted Tail, Dry Spotted Tail, Otter, Clear, Lonergan, Upper Dugout, Indian, Silvernail Drain and Cedar Creeks.

Grass Carp

The triploid grass carp is approved for use in private waters for aquatic weed control by the Nebraska Game and Parks Commission. These fish are available from licensed fish culturists, but they must be certified as 100 percent triploid by U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service inspection.

Ethical Anglers

- Know and obey fishing regulations that are in place to protect our aquatic resources, and to spread the harvest among all anglers.
- Understand the need for a personal code of behavior since laws cannot cover all situations.
- Learn techniques to handle fish that will ensure survival if released to spawn and be caught again.
- Respect the rights of other anglers as well as the rights of property owners when access to water requires crossing private land.
- Ensure good fishing for future generations by limiting their catch, rather than focusing on catching the limit.
- Cooperate and act courteously with all resource users, including other anglers, swimmers and boaters.
- Respect the environment and leave the fishing site in the same or better condition.
- Know that deliberately discarding bait fish or plants into lakes, reservoirs and other waterways can destroy the ecological balance of the aquatic environment.



Boundary Waters

MISSOURI RIVER (IOWA) — Anglers holding a valid sport fishing permit from either Nebraska or Iowa may fish in the waters of the Missouri River lying between the two states. "Waters of the Missouri River" are defined to include all oxbows, sloughs, chutes and backwaters that draw water from the Missouri River proper. Oxbows, chutes and backwaters separated from the Missouri River by land are included only if the state boundary line passes through some part of such waters. Mouths of streams are not included. Fishing may be from boats or from the bank. All anglers shall conform with the regulations of the state in which they are fishing, unless the regulations of the licensee's state are more restrictive. Then, the licensee must conform to the more restrictive regulations. Anglers may transport fish taken from the waters of the Missouri River through the neighboring state, provided they return to their home state by the most direct route.

DESOTO NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGE — Sport fishing by hook-and-line and archery is permitted as designated by area regulations. The use of trot lines and float lines is unlawful. All anglers shall conform with the regulations of the state in which they are licensed, either Nebraska or Iowa, and federal refuge regulations as posted.

MISSOURI RIVER (South Dakota) — Nebraska or South Dakota residents holding a valid sport fishing permit from their home state, may fish that part of the Missouri River that constitutes the legal boundary between the two states. This includes Lewis and Clark Lake, Gavins Point Dam and its tailwaters. However, anglers must conform to the regulations of the state in which they are fishing unless the regulations of their home state are more restrictive. Then, the angler must conform to the more restrictive regulations. At Lewis and Clark Lake it is unlawful for any person to use more than two lines with more than two hooks on each line; this restriction applies to all water area from Gavins Point Dam upstream to the Santee boat ramp in Knox County, Nebraska. In no case may an angler licensed in only one state fish in tributaries in the other state. Fishing is permitted from boat or bank.

MISSOURI RIVER (Missouri) — Anglers holding a valid sport fishing permit from either Nebraska or Missouri may fish with hook-and-line, including personally attended jugs or floats, on the flowing portion of the Missouri River lying within the boundary of Nebraska or Missouri. In no case may the angler licensed in only one state fish in the tributaries, bayous, or backwaters of the Missouri River in the other state. Anglers may not fish from nor attach any device or equipment to land under the jurisdiction of the state in which they are not licensed. Creel limits and methods of the state that licenses the sport fisherman shall apply.

Nebraska law defines game fish as all species of fish except buffalo, carp, gar, quillback, sucker and gizzard shad.


Fish Stocking

It is unlawful to release any non-native fish, reptile, or amphibian in waters of the state or to release any fish in any public waters in the state except those taken therefrom, without written authorization from the Game and Parks Com-

NOTICE — Do NOT transfer any minnows or other fish from one lake or stream to another. You may be destroying your own fishing!

Tournaments/Contests/Derbies

When they involve tagged or otherwise marked fish, fishing tournaments, derbies or contests are prohibited on (1) waters owned or controlled by the Game and Parks Commission and (2) waters stocked by the Game and Parks Commission during the preceding 24 months, excluding private lakes not owned by the state or other governmental entity.



Help Wanted

You can help fisheries managers by returning the tags from any tagged fish you may catch. The tag will be returned to you, along with data on where the fish was tagged.

Fish Kill Reports

Reports of dying fish populations may be made by notifying your local conservation officer, district Game and Parks Commission office or the 24-hour State Patrol pollution complaint number (402) 471-4545, as soon as possible. Prompt notification will make it easier to determine the cause.

Recycle Your Fish

Modern anglers know more about how to catch fish than ever before, and yet the fish we seek have not changed. They are as easy to catch as ever. As we fish

our lakes and streams with sophisticated techniques and spaceage tackle, we often create large populations of young, small fish. Yet, we anglers increasingly demand bigger fish . . . and more of them. A practical solution to our problem is voluntary catch and release. When we catch and



release, it allows us to recycle fish, thus increasing our catch rate, plus it lets the fish we've recycled grow older and larger. As the logo shows, our fishing future is truly in our own hands.

FISH CONSUMPTION ADVISORIES

The Nebraska Department of Health has issued consumption advisories for two new sites — Salt Creek, south of Lincoln from Bill Slough downstream to the Platte River and Box Butte Reservoir near Hemingford.

It also expanded the sites covered by two previous advisories — the Elkhorn River, around Norfolk from Cedar Creek upstream to Logan Creek, and the Platte River at its confluence with Clear Creek (western Butler County) downstream to the Missouri River. Previous advisories on fish from 16 other areas remain in effect (see table below). Fish from approximately 130 Nebraska stream segments and lakes have been tested since the Fish Consumption Program began in 1977.

CANCER-CAUSING AGENTS

The primary contaminants in all but three of these waters are PCBs and dieldrin, both considered probable cancer-causing agents. PCBs (polychlorinated biphenyls) are a family of chemical compounds found in old electrical equipment, such as transformers and capacitors. Dieldrin is a pesticide of the organochlorine group. Most dieldrin uses were restricted beginning in 1974, and all use ended in 1987. Dieldrin is a long-lasting chemical, however, and remains in the environment.

HOW GREAT IS THE CANCER RISK?

Advisories for cancer-causing chemicals in fish are issued when concentrations reach a risk level of 1 in 10,000. This means under a worst-case scenario, the chemicals would cause one additional case of cancer per 10,000 people eating those fish. Theoretically, each of those 10,000 people would have to eat five ounces of the fish every week for 70 years to produce that one case of cancer. According to one study, drinking one-half gallon of whole milk each week produces the same cancer risk.

THE MERCURY RISK

The advisory on Box Butte Reservoir is for mercury contamination. Last year, advisories for mercury were issued for both Oliver and Merritt reservoirs, and those advisories remain in effect. Mercury poses a risk of developmental problems in the unborn, in infants and children. The advisories are meant primarily for pregnant or nursing women and infants and children under 15 years of age. The source of the mercury contamination has not been determined, but one hypothesis is that mercury may be occurring naturally.

GOOD NEWS

Of sites tested in 1993, 15 showed no fish contamination that would warrant a consumption advisory under Nebraska protocol. These sites are the North Platte River, southeast of Lewellen; Chalkrock Reservoir, Fordyce; Calamus Reservoir, Burwell; Shell Creek, north of Schuyler; Big Blue River, Barenston and Beatrice; Branched Oak Lake, Malcolm; Niobrara River, Valentine; Big Indian Reservoir, Wymore; Elwood Reservoir, Elwood; South Platte River, Big Springs to Ogallala; Cooling Pond at Sutherland Reservoir, Sutherland; Korty-Keystone Confluence, south of Paxton; Johnson Reservoir, Lexington, and Lake Ogallala, Ogallala.

BARBLESS HOOKS WORK BEST FOR

With catch-and-release fishing growing in popularity, anglers should anglers really consider using barbless

Such hooks can reduce the time needed to return fish to the water. In fact, some fish may be released without ever being removed from the water. Most anglers won't notice a loss of hook-ups or landed fish when using barbless hooks.

Modifying your hooks for barbless fishing is easy! Simply pinch down the barbs with a pair of needle-nose pliers. You might also consider removing excessive numbers of hooks on plugs and spinners and replacing treble hooks with single ones.

Don't attempt to remove a hook that is deeply imbedded in a fish's gullet. A fish's chance for survival will be much better if you simply cut the line as close to the hook as possible.

The Sport Fish Restoration Program

The present Sport Fish Restoration Program began in 1950 with passage of the Dingell-Johnson Act, which created 10% manufacturing excise tax on fishing rods, reels, creels and artificial lures. In 1984, the Wallop-Breaux Amendment broadened the tax base to include all fishing tackle items, motor-boat fuel taxes and import duties on fishing tackle and boats.

The Sport Fish Restoration Program is an outstanding example of a "user pays, user benefits" or "user-fee" program. Through this program, a cooperative effort between the federal government and state agencies was forged that invests anglers' tax dollars in state sport fishing development projects.

YOUR PURCHASE SUPPORTS



In 1985, under old DJ funding, \$38 million were available nationwide. In 1986, with implementation of the WB amendment, funding increased to \$122 million. Today, this fund provides \$200 million per year to the states.

Funds are distributed by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, with the amount of money allocated to each state is determined by a formula which considers the number of paid sport fishing license holders and the land and water area in the state. Once a state project is approved, Sport Fish Restoration Funds are set aside to cover up to 75% of the estimated cost. The rest of the project costs are paid from funds derived from license sales.

How are Nebraska funds spent?

Project funded with Sport Fish Restoration funds in 1994 included:

Fish Management covers most management activities on the state's public reservoirs, lakes, ponds and rivers, including fish population surveys and analysis, angler surveys, renovations and regulation evaluations. Notable activities in 1994 included the renovations of Frye Lake (243 A), Swan Lake (235 A), and the evaluations of bluegill, crappie, largemouth bass and walleye size limit regulations. Also under this program is continued investigation of the Lake McConaughy management program which has been expanded to include an aggressive attempt to revitalize the lake's trout fishery along with our ongoing monitoring of walleye and white bass populations.

Research involves the bulk of the division's river and stream investigations, with most concentrated on the Missouri and Platte rivers. Under a third party agreement, the University of Nebraska is investigating the impact of alewife on major game fish species like rainbow trout in Lake Ogallala.

Hatcheries: Presently three hatcheries, Calamus, North Platte and Valentine, are operated with Sport Fish Restoration Funds. The North Platte Hatchery is undergoing a major renovation project that will improve water delivery and draining systems.

Education: While not a major budget item, education programs for the public, especially to children, are very important. Last year, 64 fishing clinics and courses were conducted with 5,268 participants. Work also continues with school teachers and volunteer instructors across the state with aquatic related projects conducted in the classroom and through clinics.

Facility Enhancement: Two similar programs deal with the maintenance and improvement of fishing areas on park and wildlife management areas. These activities include road and boat ramp maintenance and construction, fish cleaning stations, and improved angler access, especially handicap accessible areas.

Acquisitions: The amount spent on this program varies considerably from year to year, depending on what areas become available. In 1993, Frye Lake near Hyannis was purchased and developed. In 1994 a motorboat access project was scheduled for the Missouri River in Dixon County (Mulberry Bend).

Construction Contracts: This program includes projects completed by private companies, such as the construction of boat ramps, lake rehabilitation projects like those on East Twin and Stagecoach lakes, and the Belmont Diversion fish ladder. A major lake rehabilitation project was scheduled for Branched Oak Lake in the fall of 1994.

Nebraska's Sport Fish Restoration Funds are used exclusively to benefit anglers. Without these excise tax funds the number of activities to improve fishing opportunities for Nebraska anglers would be greatly reduced. All construction and improvement projects funded by the Sport Fish Restoration Program should be identified with an informational sign informing anglers how their money has been spent.

Practice Selective Harvest

Catch-and-release is now commonly practiced by many avid anglers in Nebraska. Anglers and fisheries biologists both recognize that this practice can improve the quality of the fisheries and the sport.

Fish are a renewable resource than can be harvested reasonably and wisely. So what are the best and wisest uses of our fishery resources? Releasing all fish we catch on all waters? Trying to harvest our legal limit every time? The best approach lies between these two extremes in a practice called "selective harvest."

Selective harvest is a term coined by writers of In-Fisherman Magazine to describe the best practice of catch-andrelease that allows for the wisest harvest of the fisheries resources, while maintaining and improving their quality.

The first principle of selective harvest is moderation. The days of filling the freezer with bags of fish fillets (that may stay there until freezer-burned and useless) should be a thing of the past. Instead, harvest only what can be used fresh.

The second principle is selection. In any fish community certain species and sizes of fish are more abundant than others, therefore they are better able to withstand a higher harvest. For example, panfish species such as bluegill, crappie, and perch are usually more abundant than larger game fish such as bass, walleye and pike. Consequently, they are better candidates for harvest. Remember, too, that small and medium-size fish of any species are almost always more abundant than larger fish

and can be selectively harvested.

Trophy fish of any species are difficult to catch, not because they are smart but because they are rare. These large fish are valuable in any population. Large fish are usually the best brood fish and are probably the best genetic stock in the population. Also, it's important to anglers that some trophy fish are present (all of us hope to catch that "big one" every time we cast a line). Consequently, large trophies of any species (including panfish) are the best candidates for release. Fortunately Nebraska anglers can release these trophies and still be recognized by our Master Angler program (be sure to check out that section in the fishing guide).

In summary, when we want to harvest a few fish for a meal of fresh fish, we should selectively harvest the more abundant panfish species and the more abundant small and medium-size fish of any species. Large trophy fish of all species should be admired and released. Of course, be sure to obey all fishing regulations, especially size limit regulations. Releasing fish that are "too small," undesirable or required by law to be released may be practicing catchand-release and is one thing that all anglers can do to improve the quality of our fishing in Nebraska while still enjoying a fine meal of fish now and then.







We MUST Return To Habitat Of "Good Old Days"

Remember "the good old days" when you could fish your secret "honey hole" on the river and fill a gunny sack with a limit of 5 to 10-pound catfish?

"Why don't we have fishing like that anymore?" you ask. Mostly because we don't have rivers and streams like that anymore. Much of the good river and stream fishing we remember occurred before they were channelized, dried up or otherwise degraded with mud and pollutants from their watersheds. The "good old days" of rivers and streams really happened 30 years ago.

To once again produce and support abundant riverine sport fish, such as catfish, paddlefish and sauger, we must allow the rivers and streams to return to some semblance of their original state. Toward that end, there are efforts to create a mile-wide corridor in which the Missouri River can again meander and flood, creating snags, holes, sandbars, chutes, backwaters and cut banks that all the habitat riverine fish evolved in and require. Every stretch of naturally running water in the state can stand some alterations that would produce and hold more fish, thereby making fishing better.

Remember when you could fill a five-gallon bucket with crappie bigger than your hand or bring home a cooler full of walleye or white bass from your favorite lake? For most people the good lake fishing they remember really occurred on reservoirs, and most of those reservoirs were built in the last few decades. Good fishing on those bodies of water has been relatively recent.

Many of the big reservoirs in western Nebraska were built for irrigation. The remaining reservoirs were built primarily for flood control, with hydropower and recreation only occasionally included. Instead of addressing flood control problems at their sources, we built reservoirs to catch the problems downstream. And, if flooding was a problem, as it must have been to justify construction of many reservoirs, then watershed erosion and associated pollution was inevitable.

Consequently, while our rivers and streams were being degraded, we shifted our attention and fishing efforts to these new reservoirs. As each new reservoir passed its prime, we moved to an even newer one still in its prime. The quandary we now face is that few new reservoirs are being built that have long-term fishing potential. So, we don't have any new reservoirs to shift

to. Furthermore, since reservoirs are really nothing more than man-made interruptions in rivers and streams, all the problems that rivers and streams experienced have now collected in our reservoirs and are diminishing their fisheries. Most of the good fishing these reservoirs had to offer occurred during their first years, before watershed problems had sufficiently accumulated to noticeably affect their fisheries.

It's ironic that many of these reservoirs produced their best fisheries when they were least productive. Initially, many of the nutrients that were cycled into fish flesh originated in these new reservoirs' basins. They began as grass, weeds, shrubs, trees and other terrestrial plants before the reservoir basins were flooded. After flooding they slowly decayed, releasing large quantities of nutrients, many of which eventually were assimilated into fish flesh through the food chain. By contrast, the nutrients that washed in during storms often came in such large quantities and so quickly that they could not be incorporated into the fish food chain. These nutrients produced massive algae blooms or attached to soil particles that settled on the bottom as organic sludge. There, they were often resuspended by wind-generated wave action or powerboat prop wash.

To develop better fishing in our lakes, reservoirs, rivers and streams, we must reclaim the best parts of what has been lost. The long-term solution, of course, is better watershed management, which not only will slow the aging process in our reservoirs, but also will improve our rivers and streams. While this is happening, however, we must rejuvenate our surface waters to improve living conditions (habitat) for game fish.

We must be innovative in our attempts to solve water shortage problems. Paying for improvements in water delivery in irrigation canals, such as has been done on Box Butte Reservoir, is a win-win situation. More water is kept in the reservoir for fish, while the same amount is delivered to the irrigators, instead of seeping into the ground before it arrives. The less water that leaves the reservoir, the fewer fish that will escape and die. Building fish ladders such as has been done on the Belmont Diversion of the North Platte River above Lake McConaughy, may provide the opportunity for migrating fish like channel catfish to move up-

stream, spawn and resupply depleted fisheries. The technology exists to reduce watershed erosion even further. Furthermore, the technology exists to treat the symptoms of watershed erosion, namely muddy water, nutrient loading and silting in the reservoirs.

Fish habitat rehabilitation should not be thought of as just one of several ways to improve fishing, it should be thought of as the best way. It is by far the quickest, most permanent and most dramatic way to improve fishing. Applying more regulations or stocking more fish will not overcome the limits imposed by poor water clarity, low dissolved oxygen or no water at all. To produce more fish, the carrying capacity of the body of water the fish live in must first be increased.

RECORD FISH DISPLAY

If you take a state-record game fish by hook-andline, you may wish to donate it to the Game and Parks Commission for display at Ak-Sar-Ben Aquarium near Gretna. The Commission will mount your trophy, complete with engraved plate with your name, species of fish, weight, when and where it was taken. To make such a donation, contact the Aquarium within 24 hours at 402-332-3901. Aquarium hours are 10 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. daily. Any current hook-and-line record-holder who would like to donate their trophy game fish may also contact the Aguarium.

State Record Rules

- Fish must exceed current record by at least one ounce or it will be considered as a tie.
- Fish must be taken from Nebraska waters.
- It must be legally taken by hook-and-line, underwater spearfishing, surface spearing, or archery. Fish must be caught, played, and landed by the applicant.
- Fish must be weighed on a certified scale and witnessed by a Game and Parks Commission employee. If not witnessed by a Commission employee, a notarized affidavit, signed by two witnesses and giving the requested information, may be substituted.
- Species of fish must be verified by a Commission fisheries official.
 The fish may be gutted and frozen, but the head, fins, and skin must remain intact until the species has been verified.
- Angler must display fishing permit to the individual verifying the application.
- Application forms are available from any Commission office or permit vendor.

Master Angler

If you take an outstanding catch, it may qualify for a Game and Parks Commission Master Angler Award. Application forms are available from any Commission office, conservation officer, or permit vendor. Rules include:

- All fish must be taken from Nebraska waters.
- Fish must be taken by hook and line. Fish caught on banklines are not eligible. Fish must be hooked, played and landed by the applicant for the award.
- The catch must be verified. This may be done by an employee of the Game and Parks Commission, a permit vendor, a witness or a photograph.
- Anglers 16 years of age or older must possess a current Nebraska fishing permit and enter the permit number on the application.
- Only fish immediately released are eligible for an award based on length. Any fish kept in a livewell or on a stringer must meet the minimum weight requirement to receive an award.
- Anglers may receive only one award based on weight, per year for each species. There is no limit on the number of awards per year based on length.
- Anglers who release a Master Angler fish will receive a "Catch and Release Master Angler" pin in addition to the Master Angler certificate.

Catch and Release Works

Minimum lengths listed for Master Angler Awards are intended to promote catch-and-release fishing. While fish populations are renewable resources and keeping some fish is good, big fish are rare. By releasing large fish, you are helping to maintain our future fishery resources.


Catch-and-release fishing only works when the fish you release survive. By using proper techniques, you give fish the best chance of survival. Here are a few guidelines:

- Wet hands and keep fish in water as much as possible when handling and removing the hook.
- Remove the hook gently. Do not squeeze the fish or put your fingers into the gills.
- Consider using barbless hooks.
- Release the fish only after its equilibrium is maintained.
 If necessary, hold fish gently upright until it can swim away.
- Do not play the fish to exhaustion.

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This guide lists public waters and public access points to rivers and streams. Lakes and reservoirs are numbered (1-99). Trout streams and public river accesses are lettered (A-Z). Maps are numbered and lettered according to county, from north to south and west to east. Good fishing!
